Meeting Together

Let us hold unswervingly to the hope we profess, for he who promised is faithful. This past month, the Profile Team met to continue work on the Grace profile. We are so grateful for the many people who contributed through filling out the survey we distributed in March and April. Eldership at Grace

In the Presbyterian Church in Canada, elders are men and women ordained to share along with the minister in the leadership, pastoral care, and oversight of the congregation. Through their ministries, the Word is proclaimed, God's people are nourished and nurtured, supported and guided.

We follow a model of community leadership that is found in the Bible. In Acts 6, when the apostles didn't have time to properly see to the distribution of food to the poor, they brought in new leaders to help. Here and elsewhere, we see that God calls communities together and raises up particular people from those communities to lead. From Scripture and tradition, here are a few traits that make someone a good elder:

Has strong faith in, and love for, Jesus
Lives a life that is a good example to others
Is a regular participant in the life of Grace
Is willing to learn, serve and lead others
Cares about people in and outside the church
Works well in a team

Notice that having the Bible memorized and knowing all the answers are not on the list! None of us are perfect, and elders have the same access to both God and temptation as everyone else. At the same time, elders are ordained (set apart) for the special tasks of leading the congregation. We have many resources available for those considering eldership or who are newly ordained. Elders are elected by members of the congregation and must be members themselves.

Professing members in our congregation are the ones who nominate candidates for eldership. Ballots will be distributed in the fall. Please stay tuned for more details on the election process and consider whether anyone in our congregation comes to mind when you think of the traits above. Please do not consult the people you may nominate. Instead, allow the Holy Spirit to work. Finally, and most importantly, please pray that the right people for our Session are nominated and agree to serve!

Why the name Miriam? In the same way that Miriam saved her baby brother, Moses, as we read in the bible, Miriam Centre's mission is to protect life.

Miriam Centre has been serving the community since 1988. It offers emotional and spiritual support as well as practical assistance to all who find the circumstances surrounding their pregnancy difficult. The centre also provides follow-up care and guidance after the birth of the child. There are 3 fulltime staff members and various volunteers.

Miriam Centre reaches out with love and compassion to those grieving the loss of a child through miscarriage, abortion or infant death, sharing their pain and helping them experience healing and peace.

The Centre receives no funding from the government. It could not exist without the generosity of its loyal supporters and the proceeds from various fundraising events.

As important as it has been and continues to be for Miriam Centre, this type of funding never really provided the level of stable and predictable income necessary for the efficient operation of any organization. This led to the creation of a sister organization in 1998.

MIRIAM CENTRE FOUNDATION

The Foundation is an autonomous organization, with its own Board of Directors, whose sole mission is to help Miriam Centre meet its financial requirements. The Foundation collects and invests the donations it receives; the interest produced by the investment of this capital is transferred to Miriam Centre.

In other words, while donations to Miriam Centre are used to cover ongoing expenses, donations to the Foundation are an investment in the future of Miriam Centre. Among other things, donations to the Foundation make long-term planning much easier, as they guarantee that funds will always be available to finance at least some of the work done by Miriam Centre.

The information above was taken directly from their website. Miriam Centre is located at 1803 St. Joseph Blvd, unit 107 in Orleans. The stamps that we collect all year long are given to the Miriam Centre, sorted and displayed and available for purchase at their annual stamp sale. When I'm travelling I try to pick up some stamps from the country I'm visiting to contribute to their collection. Financial donations and donations of baby and toddler essentials, Canadian Tire money, used or new jewelry are gratefully accepted too.



Hazelwood - "Making a difference; one life at a time."

"The foreigner residing among you must be treated as your native-born. Love them as yourself, for you were foreigners in Egypt. I am the Lord your God." Leviticus 19: 34 (NIV)

Recently I had the honour to represent Canada, with the RCMP Pipes and Drums, during the 80th Celebrations of the Liberation of the Netherlands. It was a very busy two weeks and we came home exhausted, but with many new friends and a lifetime's worth of great memories.

One occasion that really stood out for me was during the Remembrance Ceremony the Groesbeek Cemetery. One of the speakers was a young boy – Ivan Pryimenko – a refugee from Ukraine. His story struck home, and reminded me of the importance of Leviticus 19:34.

Here's what he had to say: "On 24 Feb 2022, I woke up as usual and started getting ready for school, but my mother said that the war had started and that I could not go to school. At first I was happy that I had a day off, but a little later I realised that it was not just one day off. I felt that my parents were scared, and I didn't understand what was happening.

The whole family slept in the corridor. The windows were blocked with cupboards and we lived without light or water. One day we woke up because the chandelier in the room was swinging back and forth because of the shelling that could be heard outside. It was very scary.

I felt like everything I loved could disappear in a second. We decided to move out of the city and leave everything behind. I had to leave my favourite room, my soft pillow, my toys and the books I liked to read with my mother at bedtime. We had to leave; it was getting too dangerous.

On the way, we were welcomed by complete strangers who shared their beds and delicious food with us. The Netherlands welcomed us and I went back to school. I was difficult at first to learn the Dutch language but now I can talk easily with my Dutch friends.

When I sleep, I often dream. I dream that there is no war in the world – nowhere, ever again.

I dream about my toys, my cuddly toys, and the smell of my house. I dream of me jumping up and down on my bed, of me running around with my brother, of our family taking a ride in the car with the windows open and feeling the wind. I dream that we go to stay with my grandparents at their house.

Today we remember the wars that have been. Not just the war 80 years ago, but the many wars since. I remember my war. We remember to honour, but also to learn. Let us ensure that children and adults do not have to flee. No fear, no senseless destruction."

World Refugee Day (June 20th) is a call for communities around the world to work toward peace and security for all, remembering especially the millions of people who are displaced, or forcibly uprooted, from their homes.

No one is a refugee by choice. Families, and children like Ivan Pryimenko, would much rather not have to leave their homes and travel to a foreign land; learn a new language; and start all over again. But they make that hard decision to protect their family; and then they depend on the compassion of others to help them on their journey.

In June 2024, the United Nations High Commission for Refugees (UNHCR) estimated that there were some 122.6 million people who have been forced to flee their homes. How can one church possibly make a difference? Consider this well known story.

One morning, an elderly gentleman went for his usual walk along the beach. There had been a storm during the night and the beach was littered with starfish tossed up by the rough seas. He noticed a young boy walking towards him. Every so often the boy would pause, reach down to pick up an object and throw it into the sea. When they met, the man said, "Good morning! May I ask what it is that you are doing?" The young boy replied, "I'm throwing starfish into the ocean. The tide has washed them up onto the beach and they can't return to the sea by themselves. So unless I throw them back into the water, they're going to die." "But there must be tens of thousands of starfish on this beach. I'm afraid you won't really be able to make much of a difference" said the old man. The boy bent down, picked up another starfish and threw it as far as he could into the ocean. Then he turned, smiled and said, "It made a difference to that one!"

It is a wonderful thing that Grace Church continues to be so active in supporting as many refugees as possible. May God bless you for taking Leviticus 19:34 to heart, and making a difference one life at a time!



Building Update submitted by Arlene Lamadeleine

Our big "Miracle Sunday" project for 2025 is to redo the interlock in front of the church. We are excited to tell you that we have now signed a contract with Harmerstone. All of the pink bricks will be removed (except for in the parking lot) and new bricks will be laid. We will not be replacing all the areas with interlock in an effort to reduce costs. You can see from the picture below (Thanks Lauren!) that we will be losing the extra path to the parking lot and the "path to nowhere" past the hall doors. These will be seeded with soil and grass instead. The garden in the front will double in size and the stairs will be almost half as wide as before. New retaining walls and foundation work for the interlock and garden will be done and new railings put in at both staircases. The ramp will be rebuilt in the same spot it is now. We expect the project to happen at the end of July or early August and will publicize the dates once we get them. (about a week before the project starts) It should take about 3 weeks to complete and cost a total of \$65,371.43 after our significant HST rebate. We are asking for both your patience during the mess this summer as well as you financial support to pay for this much needed building improvement. great outreach and we need help to make it happen!


